Inquiry: Art Theft Power Point Presentation Criteria

What?

- 1. You will be assigned a piece of stolen art to research.
- 2. You must research the facts on that piece of art that answer
 - a. ALL the inquiry questions you have generated
 - b. 10 facts about the artist
 - c. 10 about the theft, and
 - d. 5 about the piece of art itself
- 3. You will need to create a power point presentation that includes both pictures and text.
- 4. You will present your PowerPoint project, discussing each slide, not just reading out what is written but adding details and information.

How?

You will:

- 1. Use the internet and any other resources you can find to help you research the answers to your questions.
- 2. Copy and paste any information you find that is relevant into MS Word.
- 3. Key word that information using our key wording rules. No plagiarism.
- 4. Save this as <u>Inquiry Project Research Your Name</u> to your H:/Drive and/or USB Drive.
- 5. Check that you have answered all the questions and add more detail as needed.
- 6. Edit for meaning and grammar using word talk.
- 7. Proof read for COPS. Print it off, and have a partner proof read it, using the SOCs.
- 8. Copy and Paste into your slides in Power Point.
- 9. Make sure all your information is presented in a logical sequence and your presentation doesn't jump around.
- 10. You must create a bibliography using the APA format and an online bibliography creator like http://www.bibme.org/

<u>Criteria for your Power Point Presentation (What it must look like, how it must work)</u>

- 1. Use a minimum of 10 slides; a maximum of 18 slides.
- 2. Every slide must have title, a picture (1 large or 2 small) and text must be at least 18 font.
- 3. A slide should have no more than 8 sentences or points.
- 4. Text must stand out from the background colour: it must be easy to read. Slides must not be black and white. No decorations or borders.
- 5. You must choose a standard font (nothing fancy and hard to read!)
- 6. Slides must have transitions, and transitions must be via a click; not automatic.
- 7. Within a slide, you may not have automatic text appearing. You must either have all the text present as soon as the slide shows up, or you may click to make text appear one point at a time.
